

Mr. Duffy is an attorney who has retired from active practice. He currently is an adjunct professor at Texas A&M Law School where he teaches government contract law. Prior to retirement, Mr. Duffy spent 42 years in federal practice. He served as a judge advocate in the Army, retiring in the grade of Lieutenant Colonel after 21 years of service. He subsequently served in the Department of Defense for an additional 21 years as a civilian attorney. For 35 of the 42 years, he advised contracting officers, commanders, and contracting officials at multiple levels on contracting and acquisition-related issues.

Mr. Duffy has provided legal advice on nearly all aspects of acquisition to include the acquisition of services, supplies, minor construction, weapons acquisition and sustainment, indefinite delivery contracts for medical services, and international agreements to include cooperative research and development agreements with our allies. He served as the chief counsel of the Korea Contracting Agency. He also has extensive contract fraud and litigation experience having defended the Army in over a hundred bid protests and contract claims before the Government Accountability Office and the boards of contract appeals.

His last duties as a civilian attorney included: legal advisor to the Defense Department's Inspector General's auditors; Deputy General Counsel for Acquisition at the Missile Defense Command; contract counsel for the Army's Northern Medical Region to include providing contract advice to military hospitals across the East Coast as well as the old and new Walter Reed hospitals; and as Deputy Chief Counsel of the Army's Mission and Installation Contracting Command.
